

King of the K-12!

THE ALL-TIME CHAMP OF THE NATIONAL K-12 GRADE CHAMPIONSHIPS

INCE ITS BEGINNING in 1991, the National K-12 Grade Championships have crowned a champ in every grade level every fall. That adds up to a total of nearly 400 national titles! So who's collected the most first-place trophies?

Some single-year K-12 winners have gone on to become famous American grandmasters: Fabiano Caruana, who challenged Magnus Carlsen for the world title in 2018, won the sixth-grade K-12 championship in 2003. Timur Gareev, the world blindfold chess champion, won the 12th-grade title in 2005. Some current American champs won two titles. GM Awonder Liang won both the kindergarten and first grade championship in 2008 and 2009, respectively. WGM Tatev Abrahamyan, a frequent U.S. Women's Championship contender, won the eighth- and ninth-grade championships. One schoolkid-turned-world contender won three championships. That was five-time U.S. champ Hikaru Nakamura, who won the third-, fourth-, and fifth-grade titles. Could anyone do better than that?

Actually, yes! His older brother did *much* better. Asuka Nakamura is our real K-12 all-time king. He won eight K-12 championships, leaving all other contenders far, far behind. In addition, Asuka has won four other national scholastic chess titles in the spring



scholastics, the National Elementary, and Junior High Championships. Asuka is likely the overall scholastic champ with the most national titles.

Three-vear-old Asuka Nakamura came to the U.S. with his family in the last days of 1989. He didn't yet play chess. He entered kindergarten in 1991 in his small town in California and began to play the game. But he wasn't ready for the first ever K-12 championships, which took place early in the school year. By



the time the National Elementary came around in the spring, Asuka played in this first big event, with over a thousand competitors — and he won! He became national kindergarten champ. That was the beginning of his record-shattering performance.

During his young chess career, Asuka was selected to be on the All-America Chess Team and won the Scholar Chess Player Award. Another highlight: In 1998, he represented US Chess in Paris at the Disney World Rapid Chess for kids. He appeared on the cover of Chess Life, playing Mickey Mouse while World Champion Anatoly Karpov watched!

Asuka won two more important national championships: tying for first at the 2000 U.S. Junior Open, and winning the 2002 World Amateur Team Championship with teammates Hikaru and his stepfather FM Sunil Weeramantry, who gave the team its name — "Weera Family."

Chess skills helped Asuka progress to an important job at J.P. Morgan. Now he plays online, reaching a rating 2700 in blitz (five-minute) chess! "My wife Joy and I have a two-year-old daughter, Violet. I'll be excited to teach her chess someday if she wants to learn!"
